00-109	Studebaker, Dr. Parker, R. Sand	Ethel arrived in Telluride in December, 1937 to work in the American Legion Hospital. She rode from Montrose to Ridgeway on the train, and from there on the Galloping Goose. Describes her arrival at the depot--no one to meet her. She rented a room from Mrs. Studebaker for \$10 a month. Dr. at the hospital was Dr. Parker. She was here only a short time when the mine had a big lay off. She stayed on at the hospital and worked 12 hours a day, to replace nurse that left town. She worked for \$70 a month plus meals and laundry. Names other nurses that worked there.
109-130		By 1939, the town was not segregated into ethnic groups as it had been before. Talks of the train schedule. Lots of dances in town with live bands.
130-158		Speaks of the July 4th celebrations. Family Christmas celebrations. She worked 6 days a week, no coffee breaks, 8 hours a day. Names various businesses and bars in town.
158-193	Filcher, Goldsworthy, Elskamp, Pakkerine, Bella, Studebaker	Speaks of meeting husband and their wedding. They left Telluride so husband could better himself. Son Tom was born in Telluride. Speaks of the wonderful people in the Telluride community and her work at the hospital.
193-235		Medical students stayed with them one summer. Recites story about her and a medical student delivered a baby for a Spanish American couple in Leonard. Stories of Doctors activities in town and at the various mines in the area.
